
It's amazing how many Motorcycle Laws are in effect here in Virginia that most motorcyclists have no idea that they even exist. You may be incredibly surprised as we bring you the full details each month, on Virginia's Motorcycle Laws. Many "Thanks" go out to the Motorcycle Law Group for providing us with this invaluable information for Virginia riders.

#### Did you know . . . .

Virginia motorcyclists may now use non-approved lighting to make themselves more visible at night. Motorcycles may be equipped with standard bulb running lights or LED pods or strips as auxiliary lighting. Such lighting must be either red or amber in color, directed toward the ground so that no part of the beam strikes the ground at a distance of more than 10 feet from the bike, and be designed for vehicular use. Such lighting may not be blinking, flashing, oscillating, rotating, or attached to the wheels of the motorcycle. Virginia Code § 46.2-1012."

You. Your motorcycle. The open road. It's all you'll ever need, right? Well, clean underwear for tomorrow might be nice. And a few shirts, and a toothbrush, and maybe a camera. Plus a cellphone, a book to read and a sweater to wear to dinner. You know, come to think of it, another pair of pants and some shoes to replace your motorcycle boots would come in handy. So would a rainsuit, just in case. Pretty soon, it starts to add up. The fact is, whether you're headed out on a two-week trip or just picking up a box of cereal and a loaf of bread after work, there are times when you really need to carry stuff on your bike. And it's instantly obvious when you look at most motorcycles that they weren't designed to haul large quantities of anything. Fortunately, you aren't the first person to discover this. Lots of riders have faced the dilemma of getting something from here to there over the past century or so. And they've come up with plenty of innovative ideas—some of which are likely to be right for your bike. Here, you'll find a rundown of the major categories of motorcycle luggage, from cramming stuff into your jacket to high-end hard bags. We list the pros and cons of each, give you tips on what to look for when buying and show you examples of some of the more interesting products in each category.

#### A GUIDE TO CARRYING STUFF ON YOUR MOTORCYCLE



#### **Backpacks**

Sometimes you're not riding coast-to-coast. Sometimes, you're just headed to the office, or out on a day-trip. All you really need at times like those is a way to carry some files and computer disks, or a rainsuit and some water and snacks for a midday break.



#### **Rear-seat Bags**

If you're traveling alone, one of the most logical places to carry clothing or gear is on the passenger seat. And a number of companies offer rear-seat haulers that make the process convenient.



#### **Tank Bags**

Tankbags are religion. Those who've been converted will tell you they do everything from making sure you don't get lost to curing baldness.



#### **Soft Saddlebags**

When most people think of adding luggage to a motorcycle, they think of soft saddlebags. These versatile carriers have been around since before Pony Express riders were hauling mail in the Old West.



#### **All-In-One Bags**

Own a cruiser? Want to turn it into a touring bike? Then you probably already know about one type of all-in-one luggage known as back-rest bags.



#### **Hard Saddlebags**

Hard bags provide a lot of protection that soft bags can't. They're a great choice but pricier than soft bags.



#### **Integrated Luggage**

None of the above is quite good enough for you? There's still one more choice—let the motorcycle manufacturer incorporate carrying capacity into your bike.

## GREAT PLACES TO RIDE Water And A Wing with Marc Ritchie and Rose Grant



With warmer temps finally arriving this summer, Rose and I were officially in "demesh mode." The seemingly endless cycles of zipping in and removing liners was now behind us, and the sacred closet would remain largely intact, with all of our heavier gear. Regardless if it was going to be Smashing Pumpkins or Pearl Jam weather (high in the 90s), it was guite time enough we started featuring destinations with water.

The day was going to be special and we could sense it. Even though some idiot thought the stainless steel cream dispenser contained maple syrup for his once perfect pancakes earlier at Kathy's, things began to take shape in amazing form, as soon as we arrived at Wayne Cycle Shop for the day's ride.

Jennifer and Adam had a very wonderful surprise for us. They were putting Rose and I on a brand new Gold Wing Tour in beautiful Pearl Hawkseye Blue! We hadn't ridden the new version yet, so we were extremely excited, and brimming with anticipation. Zing gave us a comprehensive overview and answered all of my questions: you know, the important ones like, "How do I pair my phone" and "How do you work the radio?" There was just one more question that I almost forgot to ask before we departed, "How does it start?"

Everything appeared to be more streamlined and compact, yet with more functionality than its older siblings. We didn't have an iPhone for the Apple CarPlay feature, but pairing an Android was simple and even worked once Jennifer showed me the "Source" button under the toggle on the left hand control. There was so much information displayed. I took a few moments to let it all soak in. Zing had set the suspension preload for two up and showed us the electronic throttle's four ride modes: Tour, Sport, Econ, and Rain, that adjusts suspension damping as well. I made a firm mental note (whatever that is at my age) of two areas: the gear indicator and fuel gauge.

My first impression was, "Boy, this thing is light!" In addition to being nearly 90 pounds lighter than its predecessor, the new fork design and shorter engine, places the rider closer to the front wheel, making this machine feel more nimble than anything I've ever ridden shy of sport bikes. It all scores big points for braking too, as Rose and I experienced when Captain Manslaughter pulled out in front of us on 340 at highway speeds. As if nearly everyone in the motorcycling community wasn't already more on edge to some degree by the senseless tragedy earlier in New Hampshire, one more jackass was making sure we stayed that way. Like its prior generation, the brakes are linked with ABS, and extremely effective with very little effort. And they will have any passenger firmly against your back, without any notable loss of handling, in a threshold stop situation. The bike also boasts a very, very loud horn.

Setting the cruise heading up Swift Run Gap, the new 1833cc engine was humming along at a modest 2000 RPM without any indication of lugging on the climb. Switching to "Sport" mode





once we got into the turns resulted in a more aggressive throttle response, and something we'd never really noticed on a Gold Wing before: a little bark from the exhaust, especially on decel; which also did a nice job slowing us down. Trail braking on the leeward descent and effortlessly rolling in and out of turns created an ear to ear grin, until we caught up to one of the most feared and loathed vehicles in all of motorcycledom: the dreaded minivan.

It wasn't all bad. We were near the bottom of the hill which gave us a chance to catch our breath. And it was only a few miles before our Google guide with newly programmed British accent, instructed us to turn, bailing on our Bogart friend.

My intent was to get a pic of the GL with a water backdrop. I thought Lake Anna would do the trick. Besides, we hadn't been to Tim's before. We were on some limits, no paint, and pickup trucks doing a fine job of running blocker. There wasn't much to look at, but they were sure fun to ride with this amazing machine.

In all my travels to the Lake, I'd never been to the state park before. And the only pics I ever took of a bike with the lake, was stopped on one of the bridges years ago, just begging to get punted into the water by someone not expecting a group of bikes where they shouldn't be. The friendly guard at the gate kindly waived the seven dollar parking fee once we told her we were just there for a picture. We found a strategic spot in some shade on





very nice back roads with highway speed the side of the road that did the trick, and we went about our way. For those interested in staying a while, there's a beach and cabins for overnight lodging. You can check out www.dcr.virginia.gov/state-parks/lake-anna for more info.

> Tim's at Lake Anna Restaurant & Crabhouse was a short 15 minute ride from the park. There was outdoor seating, but Rose and I enjoyed some much welcomed air conditioning in their massive dining room with a nice view of the water. My blackened rockfish sandwich was very tasty as was Rose's crab salad. I thought to myself, "A place this big, could host a bike event." And sure enough, on their website, they're hosting a Motorcycle Poker Run and Bike Show on September 21st. They even had a Motorcycle Grand Tour of Virginia flyer posted. That's our kind of place! And who are we kidding? With three other locations as happening as this one, most of you already know how great these places are. Here's a link for more events and info: www.timslakeanna.com.

> We quickly bailed off the highway heading back. One: it was a highway. Two: we were low on fuel. I'm blaming "Sport" mode. We didn't want to go back. I joked with Rose at the overlook on Afton Mountain before we returned, "I wonder if they'll miss the bike in a week?" But seriously, go see Jennifer, or one of the other motorcycle enthusiasts at Wayne Cycle Shop, and check it out for yourself!

> I never imagined as a kid riding dirt bikes, that I'd ever be riding something this futuristic. I know not everyone is a fan of all the tech these bikes have evolved with. And I get how romantically nostalgic it is to strap everything possible to a naked bike and take off with a map taped to the gas tank. I've been that guy. I guess it just has to do with age. As I've grown older, I've come to the realization that it's the finer things in life that separate enjoyment from routine. And there comes a time when seasoned riders no longer want to fool with a shock wrench or manually checking tire pressures if they don't have to. Having the capability to stop with Formula 1-like results without wrecking, and locking up everything with the push of a button, are just some of the things that make riding more enjoyable. Noticing more and more sand in the bottom of the hour glass each day than the top, I just want to ride and not waste time tinkering with sh\*t. And on a ride like today's, two up on everything from highways to mountains, I can't think of a bike I'd enjoy more!

#### **Learning to Lean**

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and don't lean on your own understanding. – Proverbs 3:5

This verse in the book of Proverbs is one of my favorite Bible verses. It says to me that when I consider my future, I am not to depend on the way I see things, or how I reason, but to rely on God to lead me.

Unfortunately, trusting in myself is my normal tendency. I almost always interpret the world through my own thinking, my own experience, my own culture, my own knowledge, my own worldview. I tend to filter everything through what I believe to be true. But this verse tells me to trust in God instead.

The best analogy I can think of is when I first started to learn to ride a motorcycle. I did this at a fairly advanced age (for motorcycling) and I had spent several decades filtering the world through my own eyes. In many ways motorcycling defies logic: for example, if I want to turn right, I need to press on the left handlebar. appreciates every It's called counter steering and it makes no sense. Yet, it works. It also defies logic that the best way to take a curve is to see it as a straight line: entering from the outside, apex near the inside and

exit toward the outside. Or when I think I need to check the ground instead of keeping my eyes on where I am going in the corner, chances are I am going to the ground, where my eyes are leading. Or another example, when I'm riding on gravel or unstable surfaces, it's best to let the bike ride its own ride, without manipulating the handlebars and trying to make the bike go my way. I must trust the bike and the physical laws that control it, not my own imagination.

Now there is no comparison of course between The Creator of the Universe and a motorcycle, but there is a connection between trusting God and trusting your motorcycle. The basic message is: "Don't trust your own way, and the result will be

We try to be in control by planning, coercing others, figuring out the best way we think it should go. In other words, by leaning on our own understanding. But that method often doesn't work out for good. Most of our logical thinking is boxed in by the limitations of our humanness. We are not able to see the beginning and the end, but God can. He is omniscient, able to see the beginning to the end. Why would I not rely on Him rather than my own way of seeing things?

The verse in Proverbs that I started out with ends this way: In all your ways, acknowledge God...and He will make your paths straight. - Proverbs 3:6

Every motorcyclist knows that having a straight path (even in a

turn) is a smart way to ride. Why depend on my own way of seeing things, when I know the One who created the path?




#### GOOD FOR YOU

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### MAKING TRAX

**Yeah, I know.** We don't wave at them because they aren't "bikers" but they are taking the same risk as we do on two wheels. They may be taking more of a risk since they can legally only go 35 miles per hour. Many of the riders are students, commuters, people who choose not to have a driver's license or who have lost their driver's license for one reason or another, or folks who just want a fun little street legal vehicle to bop around to car or horse shows or around the lake or campground. I'm talking about mopeds!


Mopeds are classified as a scooter of 50cc or less. As a moped rider you only need a government issued photo ID, not a driver's license, and be at least 16 years old. For many years, mopeds didn't require registration. Now, they are required to have a hard tag and registration. The state even has special moped tags! Insurance is not legally required, but insuring them is usually very inexpensive so I always encour-



age my customers to insure them if possible. Mopeds are not required to get an annual safety inspection, so you should probably ask your service department to check all the lights, horn and brakes when you bring it in for its regular maintenance.

Mopeds originally had pedals which made them literally bicycles with motors, and were illegal in many states. The first Honda to arrive in America was, by today's standards, a moped, the Super Cub, when the American Honda Motor Company was founded in 1959! Mopeds didn't sell well initially, but really caught on in America in the late 70s during the national energy crisis when people needed an inexpensive way to get around. They were so popular, even Montgomery Ward and Sears, Roebuck & Co sold mopeds! Virginia was one of the first states to legalize the use of mopeds on public roads. Wayne Cycle, along with many other dealers within the Virginia Motorcycle Dealer Association, helped develop a bill within the legislature that allowed scooters 50cc or less to be classified as a moped, and did not require pedals. Throughout the years, limits on horsepower and speed limits have changed for a scooter to be classified as a moped (therefore, not requiring a driver's license, state inspection or insurance) but currently there is no limit on horsepower as long as the engine size remains 50cc or less.

Roughly 40% of our moped sales are to college students, but they are also extremely popular with retirees and RV camping enthusiasts! Most mopeds have a curb weight of approximately 200 pounds. They are lightweight and so easy to ride and maneuver! Our very



own Greg Hensley (son of our founder, Wayne) rides a Yamaha Stratoliner (1900cc!), but still brings his two mopeds to the beach every summer! Heck, mopeds get over 100mpg! Why not bring them on vacation or have one to commute!

There are many manufacturers of mopeds; Italian, Japanese, Korean, Chinese and even American. Some with excellent reputations, with ease







of service and parts purchase, and some that have only mail order parts with nothing for service support. Honda mopeds is the biggest selling brand worldwide. New mopeds come with a one year limited manufacturer's warranty, which can be extended to five years. Honda dealerships are aplenty so there is always a place to bring your moped for parts and service! We all make mistakes. Some make the dangerous choice to drink and drive and are caught and prosecuted. How can they still get to work or school or even to the grocery store without a driver's license? A moped is certainly an option for those with limitations, as long as they are in full compliance with all requirements imposed by DMV and the court. It gives them a source of transportation while they earn back their driver's license privileges.

DOT approved helmets are still required for both rider and passenger of mopeds. Eye protection is only mandatory for the rider if the moped does not have a windshield. With so many stylish and safe helmets out there, there is certainly something perfect for

In closing, I'd like you to reconsider moped ownership and their owners. Mopeds are versatile and useful and their owners are regular folks like you and me! Many of them may graduate to motorcycle ownership and many already own motorcycles! Mopeds have certainly earned their place in the motorsports industry and we certainly love them at Wayne Cycle Shop!!




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#### WHY WE MOTORCYCLISTS SHOULD NOT WANT VIRGINIA TO CHANGE THE DEFINITION **OF A SALVAGE VEHICLE**

July 24, 2019

The Chairmen of the Senate and House Transportation Committees requested that a committee be formed over the summer to look at the proposed change to Virginia law as it pertains bike back on the road. to the definition of a salvage vehicle. For those of you who followed last year's session, you will recall that there were two identical bills, Senate Bill 1364 and House Bill 1780, that would have changed the definition of a salvage vehicle by removing the requirement that the vehicle be a late model vehicle. A late model vehicle is a vehicle of the current year, or previous five years. Susan Gaston and I have been representing the Virginia Coalition of Motorcyclists (VCOM) on the committee. We have been clear in our stance that VCOM opposes these bills as they would have an adverse effect on the ability to rebuild a totaled motorcycle and put it back on the road with a clean title. Many times, older motorcycles are totaled due to cosmetic damage only; this is because of the lower value of many motorcycles as compared to cars. Under the proposed change in law, such motorcycles would become salvage vehicles, where currently that would not necessarily be the case.

By way of example, consider this situation. Mandy has been riding her trusty 1992 Honda Nighthawk that she bought when she first started riding. She has bought newer and larger bikes but can't part with her Hawk. She loves it. On the way home from the annual VCOM legislative Roundtable (which this year will be held in Richmond, Virginia on October 6th at 1:00 pm – venue to be determined) the driver of an SUV, who was McGrath, Danielson, Sorrell & Fuller checking updates on Facebook, cuts Mandy off, forcing her to The Motorcycle Law Group take evasive action which causes the bike to go down. Both Mandy and the bike have some scuffs and scrapes but are oth- Motorcyclelawgroup.com

erwise fine. However, because her bike is only worth a couple of grand, the cost to repair the bike exceeds the threshold to declare it a total loss. Under current law, Mandy can simply accept the value of the motorcycle from the insurance company, less the salvage value, and keep the bike. She can then make the necessary repairs, if any, to get her trusty scoot back on the road. Under the proposed change in the law she could not. The motorcycle would have to carry a salvage title, which can affect the ability to insure the vehicle, and the ability to put that

While it appears that the tide has turned strongly against making a change to the law, the committee has not yet made any formal recommendations. We expect that at the conclusion of our work, there will not be an endorsement to make a change to the law. That does not mean that there will not be similar legislation next year. The company urging a change in the law describes itself as a "provider of recycled original equipment (OE) auto parts for cars and light-duty trucks requiring collision or mechanical repair." In other words, they have a financial interest in creating more salvage vehicles. As such, it would not be surprising to see this bill again next year regardless of the decision made by the committee. VCOM was created to protect the rider, and we believe that the proposed change to the law would be detrimental to the Virginia rider. For that reason, VCOM will continue to oppose it.
