
This year's Virginia Motorcycle Legislative Roundtable will be held on Sunday, October 6, 2019 at the Richmond Downtown Courtyard by Marriott, located at 1320 E. Cary St., Richmond, Virginia 23219. The Legislative Roundtable is where Virginia Motorcyclists gather to discuss issues of importance to the motorcycling community, and to have input on the 2020 legislative agenda to be presented to the Virginia General Assembly by the Virginia Coalition of Motorcyclists as well as other state motorcyclists' rights organizations.

The Roundtable will start at 1:00 p.m. in the Capital Room, and press your ideas, or if you have any questions concerning this lunch will be provided. The Roundtable usually lasts three to four hours. If you can make it we would welcome your voice in deciding the issues that need to be addressed in 2020. In past years the Roundtable was the starting point for legislation such as Virginia's red light bill, the prohibition against motorcycle only checkpoints, the modification of Virginia Code to allow two two-wheeled motorcycles to travel abreast in a single lane, legislation improving Virginia's Rider Education Program, the creation of the autocycle category which removed three wheeled

automobiles from Virginia's motorcycle crash data, and legislation allowing motorcyclists to utilize accent lighting to improve nighttime visibility. This year we would expect conversations on many diverse topics affecting motorcyclists, to include lane filtering/splitting, grass clippings and other debris in the roadway, and the creation of a "Watch for Motorcycles" license plate. No topic is off limits so long as it relates to motorcycling, motorcycle safety, and/or motorcyclist rights. All voices and opinions are welcome.

If you are interested in attending we would welcome you around the table. If you are unable to attend but want to exyear's Virginia Motorcycle Legislative Roundtable, please do not hesitate to contact me.



### WHEN TWO CHAPTERS MEET

SUN 12-4



Due to the heat I decided to bump up our leaving time an hour and leave at 7am instead of 8am. The NJ group formed two even groups of 6 bikes each. We were 2 channels apart on the CB, and left ten minutes apart.

Well Fifteen folks from the south headed north, while fifteen folks from the north headed south. There was no rain in sight, however the temperatures were soaring! I am talking record breaking heat!

Sam had called me on the phone to tell me that route 81 was at a standstill by Stanton, VA so instead of getting off the highway going around the accident then getting back on, I decided to take back roads there until the last 13 miles. We dropped like 10 degrees in temperature by doing so!

The Southern Group headed north up through the Mountains of NC, and enjoyed a number of twisty roads (spending the night in NC to make a 2-day trip out of their Northward-Journey). Dave Dolinger (SC-E) GWRRA # 195758, led the group on a wonderful route!

Day 2) We were to all meet in the parking lot at 8am with a full tank of gas. My bike and Sam's bike were parked up front and had the folks evenly split up the ride by parking behind us, it looked so cool! It was a 230 mile loop with a tour of the Greenbank Observatory before having lunch at The Buckhorn Inn. The Buckhorn Inn is located at 2487 Hankey


to get on board with our journey, by hooking us up with one of the nicest pre-loved machines in their stable: a 2006 Gold Wing we recently featured on a ride through Highland and Pendleton counties. Rose and I had fallen in love with "Goldie," and her more than capable craft of carving through the Alleghenies. 
the machine you'll fall in love with.

There was a chance of thunderstorms forecast for the afternoon. Although the "severe" term was nowhere to be found, we wanted to get to our lunch destination at Bent Mountain Bistro, where we were meeting my Mom and her husband, Fe, before weather arrived. We reluctantly relied on routes 11 and 81 to get us to Buena Vista, and 501 towards Big Island where we would eventually hop on Old Blue. As a consolation, we got to hear back to back Alter Bridge songs, on Goldie's powerful audio system, swinging through the twisties of Little Deals Gap with no one in front of us. It was awful:)

've often said, if I had the means, I'd ride up and down the About 15 minutes before we arrived at Bent Mountain, we could see storms rapidly forming around us. We had just enough time to park the bike, take our helmets off, greet everyone, and get in the door, before the skies opened up. I joked if anyone wanted to dine outside. It was great seeing them, and catching up over another fine meal. We had all the time in the world as my weather app notified me that there were "severe thunderstorms expected in the area within the

We chatted with them for a while as the rain drops kept fall-





noyingly, and I put my faith in Goldie's fairing to keep us dry. Her Dunlop Elites also did a fine job of sticking to the soggy curves once back on the BRP, but it was getting hot, especially with no airflow and waterproof jackets. The rain had stopped and we were eagerly looking for an overlook to gear down at.

It's always a good thing to stumble on a cool place we've never been to. As fate would have it, the Smart View Overlook at MM 154.5 turned out to be one of those places. All too often we only stop at the overlooks that look appealing from the roadway. This one had a golf cart path that led to a log cabin built in the 1890's with a spectacular view. It was in a seclud-





ed area, and since it was off the beaten path, we enjoyed taking some "touron free" pictures while repacking our rain gear. Turns out it's a great place to hike and picnic, too, and has plumbing as an alternative to anyone who prefers trees.

Just when we thought we were out of the woods, with less than 20 miles to go, we rounded a corner, and all I could picture, was the Gorton's Fisherman somewhere in the North Atlantic, stepping out onto his deck as a wave of water introduced itself to someone who was once dry. It was a wall of liquid sunshine and we had no choice but to drive through it. Fortunately, there was another overlook right there, with some leafy trees covering just enough of the pavement for us to park under and gear up again.

True to form, the mighty GL was making a wall of its own, keeping our legs and feet dry, as we pressed on through the brief tropical depression. I still managed to get in a leg squeeze or two. Arriving at the cabins, we were relieved everything was dry. We were eagerly looking forward to the firepit later on. Rose and I immediately felt welcomed by the "Motorcycles Only Beyond This Point" sign. We later learned they also have a designated area for riders trailering their bikes. The office door was open (as it always is), but vacant. Inside, there was a clipboard with our names on a registration card, and a key for the cabin. There was also an assortment of snacks and a refrigerator filled with drinks with an honor system cash box on the counter.

As we were unpacking Goldie, Lesley drove up in her side by side to greet us.

It didn't take long for Rose and I to feel completely at home. She thanked us for coming, pointed out where everything was, and asked if we had any questions. I only had one: where's a good place to eat? Inside our room, we were instantly met

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
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


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



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
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


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
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
Molly is a 5 year old Cocker Spaniel. I found her on craigslist with a small rehoming fee of \$50. 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# TAR SNAKES



While you're out on the roads enjoying a nice ride, have you ever seen the snakes that appear out of nowhere & slither across the road? These kind of snakes don't have real fangs, but they can be just as deadly – particularly for motorcycle riders. They're called a "black-tar snake" & their populations are growing at an astounding rate. They can be seen on roads all over the U.S., including the highways & byways throughout Virginia.

#### WHAT ARE TAR SNAKES?

Tar snakes are random lines on roadways, sometimes very long & often "squiggly," made from asphalt sealer – a material made from tar – that highway crews install to help prevent further cracking of the actual roadway surface itself. As roadways age, particularly when subjected to rain, cold weather, and heat, they begin to break down. Cracks develop in the external surface and, if left unchecked, the cracks can compromise the entire roadbed.

As a temporary fix, highway construction crews fill the cracks with the tar-based sealant. It prevents water from getting into the cracks and it postpones the need for more expensive road repair. The repairs often result in random, windy lines of tar that resemble snakes; hence, the name black-tar snakes.

#### **AUTOMOBILES BARELY NOTICE TAR SNAKES**

Tar snakes have little, if any, effect on passenger vehicles and trucks; with four or more wheels on the pavement at any given moment, a slight loss of traction isn't dangerous. If you're on a motorcycle though, your encounter may be very different. The snakes can be hazardous in that they:

Have a different texture than the asphalt around them.
 Motorcycle tires react to the snakes than to the adjacent road.

- Can create an uneven, bumpy road surface that can wreak havoc on your bike's suspension.
- Become slick and soft in hot weather and when they are wet.
- Can come upon the motorcycle driver without warning.

Because tar snakes are generally softer than the surrounding asphalt, they tend to collect foreign objects – small screws, nails, and pieces of metal. Those objects can damage tires and even cause blowouts.

#### HANDLING TAR SNAKES

Motorcycle riding experts have several great tips for maneuvering through tar snakes as safely as possible. Here's the best ones that we've found:

- Scanning the surface ahead of your bike. If you have noticed "snakes" on the roadways that you routinely travel, try to memorize their location so as to avoid them.
- Riding over the snakes if you can at a 90-degree angle. Snakes are most dangerous when you ride over them "vertically."
- Reducing your speed when you identify a patch of highway that should be marked "snakes ahead."
- Remaining "loose" on the bars. Try to let the tires find their own traction as you move through the dangerous area. The stronger your grip, the more likely you'll end up in a spill.

Tar snakes can show up very quickly after a nice long stretch of beautifully paved road so stay alert & stay safe!

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# MAKING TRAX

We all know how enjoyable and spiritually fulfilling riding on two wheels is; getting out in the country, breathing the oxygen-rich air deeply, surrounding ourselves with nature while creating memories. The same feeling is available yearround on four wheels!

But before you get started there are a few things you should know. First and foremost, safety should be your highest priority. Yes, just as with riding motorcycles and horses, riding ATVs can be dangerous. There are some very important rules and laws to follow and guidelines to operate within to minimize the risks. I'll try to touch on as many as I can in this article.

My first suggestion is to read every page of the ATV Safety Institute website (atvsafety.org). They have some invaluable information on safety and off-road etiquette and laws. They have six Golden Rules that should really be followed to the letter.

# The ATV Safety Institute's Golden Rules

- 1. Always wear DOT compliant helmet, goggles, long sleeves, long pants, over-the-ankle boots, and gloves.
- 2. Never ride on paved roads, except where permitted by law.
- 3. Never ride under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- 4. Never carry a passenger unless your ATV is specifically made to carry two people.

- 5. Ride an ATV that is right for your age.
- 6. Supervise riders under 16 years old ATVs are not toys.

The ATV Safety Foundation even has e-courses that riders really should consider taking before you even put your key in the ignition. I mean, we should all have passed the MSF course, or at least passed the written and riding test at the DMV before riding a motorcycle, so why shouldn't we have just as much training before operating an ATV?

Just like riding your motorcycle, be sure to look over your ATV before riding. It would totally suck to be stranded miles from anything with a preventable problem. Be sure to check your tires and wheels, fuel and oil, chain or belts, handlebars, lights and electronics, and all the buttons and knobs. It is probably not a bad idea to carry a first aid kit, a water bottle, a snack, and tool kit. Fortunately, most modern ATVs come with a tool kit under the seat.

Although they didn't invent the ATV, Honda made them popular in 1970 with a three-wheeled machine called the ATC90 (All-Terrain Cycle). It had no suspension, but instead, big balloon tires. They gradually introduced larger displacement models throughout the 70's and 80's. In the 80's, Yamaha, Kawasaki, Polaris, and Suzuki all released their own three-wheeled models. Suzuki was the first to release a 4-wheeler in 1982, coining the term "Quad". Honda released their 4-wheeler in 1984, the TRX200, and ruled the market, owning almost 70 percent of all ATV sales here in the US. The 3-wheeler officially came to an





end in 1987 when safety concerns resulted in the more stable 4-wheel ATVs becoming the industry standard. ATVs even have their own Motocross and off-road racing events nationwide!


Picking the right ATV for you is just a matter of knowing what you'll be using it for. Do you want to use it for hunting or exploring nature? Do you want to use it for racing or competing? Would it be extremely useful getting around and maintaining your farm? Maybe you only want it for a couple trips a year to a favorite recreation destination. They are available in 2WD and 4WD, most adult models are liquid cooled and fuel injected, and many have automatic transmission. The more capable models have locking differential and independent rear suspension. Power steering is a real arm saver on long days of riding the trails, and something I personally wouldn't go without. Some of the larger displacement models are capable of towing well over 1,000 pounds! Be sure to tell your salesperson exactly the features you need. I'm sure they would be happy to find you the perfect machine to meet your needs.

In conclusion, ATVs offer riders an excellent way to get away from everything, and spend time in either solitude or fellowship, surrounded by God's great cathedral. Whether your goal is to reach your destination quickly or if the journey IS the destination for you, there is a perfect ATV and perfect trail for you. There are several dedicated ATV trails throughout Virginia, so be sure to ask your local powersports dealership personnel where they ride. If you don't have enough land of your own, you could also ride on a friend or neighbor's property, but be sure to get the land owner's written permission first. So let's get out there and have fun!




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#### **USING A GPS ON YOUR MOTORCYCLE**

Beware. Your GPS may be collecting evidence against you. More and more motorcyclists today are using GPS (Global Positioning Systems) to plan trips, get directions, and keep track of miles traveled. However, keep in mind that, if you are in a motorcycle accident, you may be collecting evidence that could be used against you in both a criminal and civil trial.

#### What GPS systems track on vehicles

Most GPS systems allow you to keep track of your speed. As such, they can be used as evidence in court. I have come across jurisdictions which, at the scene of an accident when speed is a question, will seize a crash victim's GPS, get a search warrant, and download the information pertaining

speeding ticket. It can, if the injured party was speeding, free. put their ability to collect damages for their injuries at risk. Virginia is a contributory negligence state (as are both North Carolina and Maryland). That means that if the party McGrath, Danielson, Sorrell & Fuller that injured you can show that you were in some way at fault in causing the accident, then your claim can be de- 1-800-321-8968

Speed can be used as a contributing factor to deny an injury claim, even if the other party is more at fault than you. Even in other states which are comparative negligence states, speed can be used to reduce the amount of your claim if another person injures you.

#### Should you use a GPS on your motorcycle?


Now keep in mind that I am in no way suggesting that you should not use a GPS on your motorcycle. I am merely suggesting that if you do, keep in mind that, depending on the system and how you use it, you could be collecting evidence that could eventually be used by the party that injures you to avoid paying for the injuries that they caused.


